

# ANTIQUED DRAGON GOBLET



## MATERIALS

CCX4009 Dragon Goblet Medium Brush Detail Brush Fan Brush Small Brush Yellow Sponge

## COLORS

CMM 17 - Margarita CMM 27 - Kiwi CMM 41 - Perfectly Purple CMM 93 - London Fog CMM 45 - Indigo CMM 59 - Turquoise CMM 98 - Red Head CMM 31 - Licorice

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## INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. Use a fan brush and apply one coat of Licorice all over the entire Dragon.
- 2. Use a yellow sponge to wipe the outside of the goblet. Wipe off the raised sections, letting the paint remain in the crevices. Allow the piece to dry for a couple of minutes.
- 3. For the remaining colors, we need to thin them down with water. Mix equal parts water and paint.
- 4. Use a liner brush to apply two coats of watered-down Indigo to the edges and raised areas of the wings.
- 5. Next, apply two coats of watered-down Turquoise to the remainder of the wings.
- 6. Paint the underside of the neck, the chest, the belly, and the underside of the tail with two coats of watered-down Margarita.
- 7. Working on the face, apply two coats of watered-down Indigo to the crest, two coats of Margarita to the flaps on the sides, and two coats of turquoise to the remainder of the face.
- 8. Next, apply two coats of watered-down Turquoise to the tip of the dragon's tail.
- 9. Apply two coats of watered-down Kiwi to the rest of the dragon.
- 10. Under the dragon's foot and between the tail and body on the back are flames. Apply two coats of watered-down Red Head to the flames.
- 11. Next, apply two coats of watered-down London Fog to the sword and the base. Don't forget the little section between the tail and the foot.
- 12. Finally paint the inside of the goblet with 3 coats of Licorice, or whichever color you prefer!

#### TIPS

- Rinse the sponge frequently while you're wiping the paint off the ridges and smooth parts of the princess. It's okay to leave little smudges of it on the smooth parts.
- By watering down the paint, we will achieve a translucent color that allows the black to show through.
- This piece really shines AFTER it comes out of the kiln trust the process!

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
